Pupil Premium Report (Website) 2015-16



What is Pupil Premium?

Pupil Premium is a sum of money that is allocated to schools each year to ensure that all children have an equal chance to succeed. The amount of pupil premium granted to each school is determined by:

The number of children who are registered for Free School Meals or who have been entitled to Free School meals during the past 6 years

The number of children who are classed as "looked after children" or who have been adopted from care

The number of children from families with parents in the Armed Forces.

How do we use Pupil Premium Funding?

At Telford Infant School we use our pupil premium funding to provide a range of additional support for eligible children. Impact is continuously monitored for each child who is eligible for pupil premium and these interventions have had an impact on children's progress and attainment. Targeted support is provided through both one-to-one and small group interventions tailored to meet the children's individual needs.

Extra support is not set for the whole year because we recognise that children's needs and personal circumstances can change. Our approach to spending the Pupil Premium Grant is to address the needs of the whole child as we feel that this is what will lead to greater academic success.

What are our key objectives?

Our key objectives in using pupil premium funding are:

To narrow the gap between pupil groups.

To eliminate barriers to learning and progress.

To ensure accelerated progress.

How do we measure the impact?

It is the responsibility of our Governing Body to ensure that we are spending this funding effectively and the Headteacher reports on its impact at least termly.

We continuously and rigorously track the progress of all pupils through a variety of assessments. Examples include ongoing teacher assessment, formal half termly pupil progress meetings scrutinising progress and attainment in reading, writing and mathematics, Boxhall profiling, This ensures that we can identify immediately if children are not progressing to their potential. If this is the case we can quickly intervene and instigate a different approach.
