Telford Infant School Pupil Premium Report (Website) 2017-18



BACKGROUND

What is Pupil Premium?

Pupil Premium is a sum of money that is allocated to schools each year to ensure that all children have an equal chance to succeed. The amount of Pupil Premium allocated to each school is determined by:

The number of children who are registered for Free School Meals or who have been entitled to Free School meals during the past 6 years.

The number of children who are classed as 'looked after children' or who have been adopted from care.

The number of children with families with parents in the armed forces.

How do we use Pupil Premium Funding?

At Telford Infant School we use our Pupil Premium funding to provide a range of additional types of support for eligible children. Our approach to spending the grant is to address the needs of the whole child as we know this will lead to greater academic success. The Finance report below shows how the 2017-18 grant was spent.

Impact is continuously monitored for each child who is eligible for the grant so that funding ca be used to maximum effect for each child. Whilst we plan how we are likely to spend the grant for the forthcoming year we also recognise that children's needs and personal circumstances can change.

What are our key objectives?

Our key objectives in using Pupil Premium funding are:

To narrow the gap between pupil groups.

To eliminate barriers to learning and progress.

To ensure accelerated progress.

How do we measure the impact of how we spend the Pupil Premium grant?

It is the responsibility of the Senior Leadership team and our Governing Board to ensure that we are spending this funding effectively and the Headteacher reports on its impact at least termly. We also have 2 governors who are responsible for monitoring Pupil Premium spend and impact and they too report back to the Full Governing Board.

We continuously and rigorously track the progress of all pupils through a variety of assessments. Examples include: ongoing teacher assessment; Pupil Progress meetings; Boxhall profiling; attendance data; measuring the impact of the quality of teaching and learning; pupil voice and talking to parents. This

ensures that we can identify immediately if children are not progressing to their potential. If this is the case we can quickly intervene and instigate a different approach.

When evaluating the achievement of pupils in relation to our spending of the Pupil Premium, we consider how well gaps are narrowing between the performances of different groups of pupils in the school and compared to all pupils nationally and how well pupils make progress relative to their starting points.

What are the main barriers to educational achievement faced by eligible pupils in our school?

Barriers include lower than average attendance and poor punctuality, issues around well being and self esteem, lack of opportunities for extra curricular involvement, financial ability to support learning visits, other barriers also being supported by children's services.

Not all our children eligible for Pupil Premium experience all of these barriers.

When will this strategy be updated next?

The next Pupil Premium Strategy Review will be September 2018.
