Orthoptic Department – School Vision Test

Dear Parent / Legal Guardian

We are writing to inform you that Vision Tests will be carried out at school within the next few weeks. It is important to detect vision problems early in childhood so that effective treatment may be given.

How is the test done?

Vision is assessed using a matching letter test, whilst each eye is covered in turn. Children do not need to be able to read or even speak for the test to be carried out. If your child is unable to complete the test then they will be referred into the Hospital Eye Department.

Who will do the test?

The test will be carried out by an Orthoptist or an Orthoptist trained Health Care Professional.

Does the parent need to attend?

It is not necessary for parents to be present for the test. We encourage children to regard it as a normal part of their school day.

What happens after the test?

You will only be informed of the outcome if your child needs to be referred for further tests. If your child is found to have a reduced level of vision you will either receive a letter advising you to take them to a high street Optometrist or they will be referred directly into the Hospital Eye Department.

After this test, it is advised that your child is taken to an Optometrist for an annual eye checks. Eye tests are funded by the NHS for all children under the age of 16.

The vision test will form part of your child's Health Record and results will be sent to the Child Health Team.

What if my child is absent from school?

We advise you to take your child to a high street Optometrist.

How to opt out

We recognise that there may be circumstances in which it would not be appropriate for your child to have the vision test, for example if your child is already under the care of the Hospital Eye Department.
